POLICY DIALOGUE ON CLIMATE CHANGE CONDUCTED IN BIRATNAGAR

A Policy Dialogue on Climate Change and Consultation was successfully conducted in Biratnagar, Nepal's industrial hub in eastern lowland Tarai. Professor Maheswor Man Shrestha, Vice Chancellor of Purbanchal University inaugurated the program amidst a hall full of over 100 enthusiastic participants who represented government line agencies, research and educational institutions, political parties, local and non government organizations, youth volunteers and mass media. Professor Shrestha said, taking climate change information to the general populace and raising awareness are more important for its negative impacts are looming around.
